
WELCOME TO UH!



Elul Shabbat Speaker Series

Torah of the Days of Awe: Stories that Shape Us with Rabbi Rosenberg

The High Holy Days are framed by powerful Torah readings—narratives that ask us to wrestle with beginnings, tests of faith, ritual, community, and the meaning of holiness. In this two-part Elul series, we'll dive into the iconic Torah texts of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Why these stories? What do they reveal about how we return, renew, and repair?

Session 1: In the Beginning, A Test

Saturday, August 30

Creation and the Binding of Isaac—Rosh Hashanah's Torah stories and the tensions they hold. What does it mean to begin again? What does faith require of us?

Session 2: A Tale of Three Readings

Saturday, September 13

Leviticus 16, Nitzavim, and Leviticus 19—how the Yom Kippur Torah readings move us from sacrifice to covenant to ethical holiness, and why the Reform movement changed what we read.

It's Good to Be a Prophet: Learning from the Wisdom of the Haftarah for the Holy Days with Rabbi Reinhart

Join Rabbi Reinhart for these in-depth explorations of the Haftarah portions for the Holy Days.

Session 1: Rosh Hashanah: Hannah's Prayer was Answered, Might Ours be Too?

Saturday, September 6

We'll learn the story of Hannah, examine her prayer, and consider some of the allegorical and metaphorical lessons we might learn from her example as we contemplate the themes of the High Holy Days.

Session 2: Yom Kippur: ...But is It? The story of Jonah and more

Saturday, September 20

We'll focus on the fascinating tale of Jonah and the Whale, reimagining the "Big Fish" and deliberating over the role of fate and divine force, while asking the question, "Is it good to be a prophet?"





Shabbat Speaker, Uri Keidar Friday, September 12, 6:30 pm

Our Jewish Federation is part of a JFNA collaborative called iRep, a coalition of 28 Jewish Federations and Foundations that work together to promote respect for diverse expressions of Judaism in Israel. Israel Hofsheet is one of several organizations that iRep supports. We welcome Uri Keidar on Friday, September 12 to speak to us about his work during our Shabbat service.

Israel Hofsheet (Be Free Israel) is the largest non-partisan civic movement that works to change policy and legislation in religious-state relations in Israel. They promote freedom and pluralism in the public sphere.

Uri Keidar

Uri Keidar is the Executive Director of Israel Hofsheet, the largest advocacy organization in Israel in the field of religious freedom and Jewish pluralism. Israel Hofsheet works with Members of the Knesset, Ministers, and Government Officials to promote liberal policies in the field of Religion and State, and also promotes change through Municipal politics and Change-Makers training. The organization also creates national campaigns that move the needle around public opinion on these ideas. It also promotes Bottom-Up change as it conducts hundreds of Jewish weddings a year without the Chief Rabbinate's involvement, making it the most prominent organization in Israel to do so.

Before this role, Uri spent over seven years in leading positions in civil society organizations and politics, both in elected and professional positions. Uri grew up in Kibbutz Givat Brenner, where he now lives with his wife, Ayelet, and their children, Imri, Adam, and Eytan. Uri earned his BA in political science and communications from Ben Gurion University of the Negev, where he served as the elected Chairperson of the Student Union, and also holds a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Tel Aviv University. He completed his military service as a tank commander in the IDF's armored corps, where he still serves in active reserve duty.

Graves of the Fathers and Memorial Practices

Interested in memorial customs? Check out this article from Temple Emanu-El in Dallas:

Kever Avot is the custom of visiting the graveside of parents or close relatives and taking part in a prayer service at the cemetery. The theme of the prayers is peaceful eternal rest for the departed and an invocation for G-d's aid to the living based on the pious deeds of the dead performed in their lifetime.

Judaism does not encourage "praying the dead" and custom the Kever Avot was, therefore, limited special occasions; the day of the Yahrzeit, before Rosh Hashanah and during the



10 Days of Awe culminating in Yom Kippur, gravesite pilgrimages take on an even higher level of significance because they come at a time of spiritual soul-searching and renewal.

The tradition of visits before the High Holy Days began in the 14th century. More recent Jewish history recounts regular pilgrimages to the burial sites of revered rabbis and loved ones in Sephardic

and pre-World War II European Jewish communities on the anniversary of a death, fast days and other times during the year. Visitors showed love and respect for the departed and prayed for the soul's safe journey.

Some religious and ethnic communities have their own unique customs for Kever Avot. The Kaddish, which affirms the living's relationship with G-d and elevates the souls of the deceased to their final resting place, is typically recited along with El Malei Rachamim, a plea for rest for the soul that originated in the Jewish communities of Western and Eastern Europe.

Sephardic Jews perform Kever Avot on erev Rosh Hashanah, so they begin the holidays with a sense of connection with their families. They recite the Hashkavah, a memorial prayer with separate texts for men and women, and Yih'yi L'ratzon, in which they ask the deceased to pray on their behalf for forgiveness and a good year. Persian Jews add Psalm 119, a Hebrew acrostic in which family members read the stanzas that begin with the letters in their loved ones' names. They also bring flowers and rose water to the grave, in accordance with Iranian tradition, and spices (minei besamim).

Other customs include placing stones on the grave to mark the visit, which some believe dates to ancient times when piles of stones were used to indicate burial sites. Giving tzedakah on behalf of the deceased is also customary since Jewish tradition teaches that those dwelling in God's presence cannot perform this mitzvah.

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
